The day started with Professor West discussing her vision and ideas for the future of the BSP UG group. Her excitement really electrified the room and got us all feeling the same way. This was followed by Dominic Clark-Roberton, Chair of the UG group, who from start to finish, was charismatic and an excellent speaker. Dr Dunn's clinical cases were some incredible evidence of this put into practice - showing us the power we have as students to change a patient's attitudes towards their oral health by simply making them understand the nuances of periodontal disease. As well as how to approach the topic, making it less patronizing but a more relaxed approach on grey-areas such as how to tell your patient they aren't brushing effectively. His excellent analogies when explaining to patients the importance of their own efforts certainly did not go amiss and are things we can use with our own patients back on Clinic. The "rock in the river" analogy was one which made us giggle and another favourite (although as he humbly conceded, not his own) was 'patients have to have a longer tooth or tooth no longer'! when describing the recession we see after successful periodontal treatment. The passion of Professor Nicola West, Dr Ian Dunn and Dom was brilliantly engaging and welcoming, highlighting how approachable everyone in the BSP is and making the society unique because of its family feel. Everyone is part of it for the same purpose, but each person brings their own unique perspective and life experience to it.

After disbanding, we made our way to The Houses of Parliament for a guided tour which was absolutely incredible! Not only was our student group in attendance but members of the BSP who later that evening were to attend a dinner to celebrate the 70th anniversary of the Society, many of whom I recognized from papers and publications - so it was safe to say I was star struck!
